

<p><b>Safety Online</b></p>	<p>Introduce the lesson by talking about cyber bullying, what it is and some facts. – <b>Over 95% of teenagers use social networking sites.</b> Discuss the dangers of putting personal information on their Facebook or Twitter, etc. – <b>Name, age, address, school, numbers, etc.</b> Go through the power point if needed.</p>

<p><b>Scenario Cards</b></p>	<p>Split the children into small groups and give each group a card. Give the children a couple of minutes to discuss what they would do in those kinds of situations. Then as a whole class talk about some of the scenarios and have a discussion as a class what would be the right thing to do. If you have more time, allow the children to act out the scenario to the rest of the class and then discuss as a whole.</p>

Get the students to throw it over to someone across the room. Ask a few people to read out what their snowball says and have a group discussion.</p>
